# Election season begins Two weeks and six voting days to go

Last week was probably the longest string of days for a legislative session the first week of March in current history. We started with Crossover Day Monday, March 3rd, when all bills must pass their chamber of

orientation to stay alive with the day ending very close to midnight. Then it was a mad dash to move bills into committees and hold as many committee meetings as possible to take testimony on issues such as coverage for autism by small insurance plans (SB 397) and many other issues. The legislature is in Monday 3/10 through Thursday 3/13 this week, days 35-38.

## **FY 2015 Budget Progress**

The full Senate Appropriations Committee met early March 4th, Tuesday morning, to pass out the FY 2015 budget. As noted in a special Portal, language was put in the budget to direct the Georgia Department of Behavior Health and Developmental Disabilities to work with the Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency on matching funds to draw down more federal funds. Many details still need to be worked out but right now we need to make sure the House and Senate Conference Committee maintain this language. #### **Autism Mandated Coverage**

<u>SB 397</u> was assigned the House Insurance Committee. The bill's sponsor, Senator Tim Golden (R-Valdosta), gave a thorough review of the bill to committee members. The mandate would require employers

with 10 or more employees to have coverage in their plans to provide behavior modification therapies to children up to age 6, with a cap of \$35,000 per year. While families and health advocacy organizations supported the bill, more business organizations lined up against the mandated coverage. The Georgia Chamber of Commerce, National Federation of Independent Business and small business owners said this would cost much more and did not agree the cost would out-weigh the benefit. Chairman Richard Smith (R-Columbus) assigned the bill to a special committee to review and make their recommendations. They have only four days this week to get it done. Many times a move like this is sure to kill a bill so close to the end of the session. We shall see if advocacy by families and the Marcus Center can overcome powerful statewide business interests.

#### **Election Season Begins**

There were no surprises in those qualifying to run for State House or Senate seats. Legislative districts were drawn very tightly packed for one party or another earlier in the decade, making most Districts noncompetitive between the two parties. Even though folks say they want new representatives there won't be much to choose from either this spring or fall. After qualifying closed at noon on Friday there were no candidates from the opposition party in more than three quarters of legislative districts.

The House is assured to stay firmly in Republican control as 69 Republican House members have no opposition in the primary and another 27 have no Democratic opposition in the general Election. This will give Republicans 96 guaranteed seats, and they only need 91 to comprise a constitutional majority. The surprise is that Speaker David Ralston does have opposition in the primary from a teacher/coach in Ellijay, Sam Snider. The other top four House Republican leadership positions have no primary or general opposition.

The Senate is a little closer with 19 Republican incumbents assured reelection with no primary or general election opposition. There are another six districts where no Democrat has qualified. This will give Republicans 25 seats leading to the 29 they need for a majority. Barring any major upsets there is a clear path for the Senate to remain 38-18 in party composition of Republicans to Democrats.

In terms of statewide constitutional offices at least one Democrat has qualified for every office except District 1 of the Public Service Commission currently held by Doug Everett, who also has no primary opposition. Governor Deal has two opponents in the primary, current School Superintendent John Barge and former Dalton Mayor David Pennington. In the General Election the winner of the primary will face Senator Jason Carter. You can view the full list of qualified candidates on the Georgia Secretary of State's website.
